Meeting Notes:

Dr. Ashley noted participation in the Trauma Medical Director's conference calls are part of the Trauma Centers' contract for Commission-directed funding and is one of the criteria in the Commission's Performance Based Payment program.

Discussion on frequency and format of meetings: General agreement to hold conference calls quarterly, brief meeting minutes/notes produced and agenda (legislative update, old and new business) developed ahead of time. However, next call will be in two months or May 2011. Conference Calls will be arranged by Dr. Ashley's office and staffed by Trauma Commission personnel.

Agreement reached to hold an annual face-to-face Trauma Medical Directors meeting in association with the ACS Georgia Committee on Trauma. It was suggested this annual meeting could coincide with the Georgia COT-sponsored "resident trauma research competition." Dr. Ashley will work with Dr. Chris Dente to arrange.

Discussion of ACS Trauma Quality Improvement Program: General agreement among attendees for Trauma Commission to move forward and investigate providing TQIP to Georgia designated trauma centers. Currently, Memorial (Savannah) and Grady (Atlanta) participate in TQIP. Cost of TQIP to be approximately \$9000 annually with no additional staff support required to participate.

"The fundamental goal of TQIP is to provide risk-adjusted benchmarking of designated/verified trauma centers to track outcomes and improve patient care. To accomplish this, the American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma (ACS COT) utilizes the infrastructure of the National Trauma Data Bank (NTDB) to collect valid and reliable data, provide feedback to participating trauma centers, and identify institutional characteristics that are associated with improved outcomes.

TQIP supports the College's mission of promoting the highest standards of surgical care through the evaluation of surgical outcomes in clinical practice, and promises to improve the quality of trauma surgical care. The objective of TQIP is to build upon this existing infrastructure through enhancements in the following areas: *data collection, benchmarking, and identifying structures and processes of care.*" <http://www.facs.org/trauma/ntdb/tqip.html>

Dr. Ashley reported on the Commission's budget for FY 2011 (\$10.5M) or a 53% cut from projections and the projected FY 2012 budget (\$16.5M). Governor Deal has the Commission's budget directly tied to Super Speeder revenues. A brief discussion of revenue collection percentages and lag for those revenue collections occurred.

Discussion on Sen. Goggins new trauma funding bill introduced in the Georgia Senate. This bill is very similar to past Senate Resolution that produced the proposed Constitutional Amendment 2, which failed during last November election. The difference between the two bills is there will be no new fees assessed as a result of the new constitutional amendment, rather \$10 will be taken from current vehicle tag fee and placed into the Georgia Trauma Trust Fund for trauma system funding. To move this forward will require another vote by Georgians to pass the Constitutional amendment, which could not occur until November 2012. There was discussion that this bill may sit in the legislature this year and not be passed out until the next session.

Hardware - is a catchall category to include the cost of antennas and other outside infrastructure, as well as cost of setting up an office (furniture, office equipment, supplies, etc and labor associated with setting up the office). The one time labor cost of setup will be significant.

Backup generator - may cover generator, probably won't cover associated labor and definitely won't cover cooling, if needed for the server room.

Call recorder, no longer necessary, but the \$8K is roughly the needed supplement for the backup generator budget.

Workstations - think of this as non TCC PC supplies, If we treat TCC work stations as dedicated, we need a least a couple of PCs for doing basic office work - word processing, Internet, email, etc. Similarly, we need a couple of phones not tied into the TCC for normal office conversations, a quality printer/scanner/copier and possibly a large screen TV/monitor (for visualizing AVLS functionality - if determined to be placed in TCC)

Building lease and utilities - covers rent and utilities, but there will be a monthly charge for a couple of months for phone lines/Internet, as well as probably a one time charge for setup and installation of same. Recommend having at least one dedicated cell phone at the TCC as part of COO. In the event landlines are down, having a cell line gives one more option for remaining functional

Senate Bill 76

AS PASSED SENATE

**A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT**

1 To amend Code Section 31-11-102 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
2 the duties and responsibilities of the Georgia Trauma Care Network Commission, so as to
3 revise certain provisions relating to uncompensated trauma care provided by emergency
4 medical services; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other
5 purposes.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

7 **SECTION 1.**

8 Code Section 31-11-102 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the duties and
9 responsibilities of the Georgia Trauma Care Network Commission, is amended by revising
10 paragraph (2) as follows:

11 "(2) For the first two fiscal years in which funds are appropriated to the commission for
12 distribution, to distribute such funds in the following areas with the priority for
13 distribution to be set by majority vote of the commission:

14 (A) Physician uncompensated trauma care services provided in designated trauma
15 centers;

16 (B) Emergency medical service uncompensated trauma care services provided to
17 patients transported to designated trauma centers and to trauma patients transported to
18 out-of-state hospitals as approved by the commission;

19 (C) Uncompensated trauma care services of designated trauma centers;

20 (D) Trauma care readiness costs for designated or certified trauma care service
21 providers; and

22 (E) Trauma care service start-up costs for providers seeking a trauma care designation
23 or certification.

24 The commission shall adopt a formula that prioritizes the distribution of state
25 appropriated funds that may be implemented during the third state fiscal year in which

26 funds are appropriated to the commission for distribution. Such formula shall be
27 evaluated and modified, if needed, every two years thereafter;"

28 **SECTION 2.**

29 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.

The House Committee on Health and Human Services offers the following substitute to HB 307:

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

1 To amend Article 5 of Chapter 11 of Title 31 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
2 relating to the Georgia Trauma Care Network Commission, so as to provide for burn centers
3 and burn patients as part of the trauma network; to revise definitions; to provide for related
4 matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

6 **SECTION 1.**

7 Article 5 of Chapter 11 of Title 31 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the
8 Georgia Trauma Care Network Commission, is amended in Code Section 31-11-100, relating
9 to definitions, as follows:

10 "31-11-100.

11 As used in this article, the term:

12 (1) 'Burn trauma center' means a facility that has been designated by the Department of
13 Community Health as a burn center and that admits at least 300 patients annually with
14 the burn specific principal diagnosis codes as published by the International
15 Classification of Diseases.

16 (2) 'Trauma burn patient' means a patient admitted to a burn trauma center with a burn
17 specific principal diagnosis code as published by the International Classification of
18 Diseases who has at least one of the following injuries or complications based on criteria
19 developed by the American Burn Association:

20 (A) Partial-thickness burns over at least 10 percent of the total body surface area;

21 (B) Burns that involve the face, hands, feet, genitalia, perineum, or major joints;

22 (C) Third-degree burns in any age group;

23 (D) Chemical burns;

24 (E) An inhalation injury;

25 (F) A burn injury and preexisting medical disorder that could complicate management,
26 prolong recovery, or affect mortality;

H. B. 307 (SUB)

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27 (G) Burns and concomitant trauma, such as fractures, in which the burn injury poses
 28 the greatest risk of morbidity or mortality; or

29 (H) Burn injury patients who require special social, emotional, or rehabilitative
 30 intervention.

31 ~~(1)~~(3) 'Trauma center' means a facility designated by the Department of Community
 32 Health as a Level I, II, III, or IV or burn trauma center.

33 ~~(2)~~(4) 'Trauma patient' means a patient who is on the State Trauma Registry or the
 34 National Trauma Registry of the American College of Surgeons or who is a trauma burn
 35 patient.

36 ~~(3)~~(5) 'Trauma service codes' means the ~~ICDA-9-CM~~ International Classification of
 37 Diseases discharge codes designated as trauma service codes by the American College
 38 of Surgeons, Committee on Trauma.

39 ~~(4)~~(6) 'Uncompensated' means care provided by a designated trauma center, emergency
 40 medical services provider, or physician to a trauma patient as defined by the Georgia
 41 Trauma Care Network Commission who:

42 (A) Has no medical insurance, including federal Medicare Part B coverage;

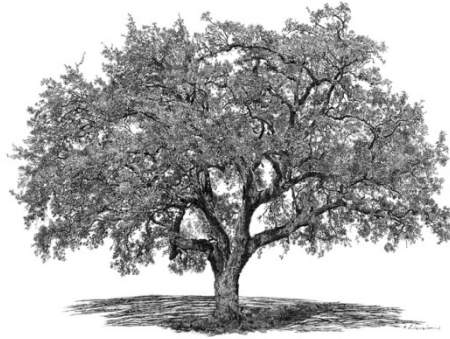
43 (B) Is not eligible for medical assistance coverage;

44 (C) Has no medical coverage for trauma care through workers' compensation,
 45 automobile insurance, or any other third party, including any settlement or judgment
 46 resulting from such coverage; and

47 (D) Has not paid for the trauma care provided by the trauma provider after documented
 48 attempts by the trauma care services provider to collect payment."

49 **SECTION 2.**

50 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.

**House Health and Human Services Committee
Substitute to House Bill 307 Summary**

This bill defines two terms, adding them to the definition section in O.C.G.A. 31-11-100:

- 1) At line 12, the term “Burn Trauma Center” is defined to be a burn center, designated by DCH as a burn center, but that has a minimum of 300 inpatients on an annual basis with burn specific CPT codes; and
- 2) At line 16, “Trauma burn patient” is defined by designating that patient having been admitted to a burn trauma center with a burn CPT code with at least one of the injuries or complications, based on American Burn Association criteria, found in lines 20-30.

These two terms would then be applied to law at line 31, the definition of “Trauma Center.” The definition would remain the same except to allow a designation by DCH of a Level I, II, III, IV or burn trauma center. Additionally, the definition of “Trauma burn patient” is reflected in the definition of “Trauma Patient,” by adding those patients to the current patients listed on the State Trauma Registry.

A “housekeeping” update is found at Line 36 to prepare for the 2012 move to the “10” codes, which would allow the trauma code to be ready for implementation to prevent having to go back into the code next year to update it.
